About Us


The Surrey Food Bank is a non-profit organization committed to "Helping people help themselves." Since 1983, the Surrey Food Bank has been assisting low-income individuals and families who live in Surrey and North Delta by providing bi-weekly food hampers to supplement their food needs.

All funding comes directly from the community as the food bank does not receive any core government funding

History

In 1981, in response to a downturn in the economy, a coalition of churches opened a food cupboard in Surrey. Two years later, in June 1983, the Surrey Food Bank Society was formed and opened up in a dilapidated building on King George Highway. The location and the Society itself were deemed to be temporary measures until the economy turned around and people could get back on their feet.

What began as a temporary solution to a temporary problem has grown to a 7,000 sq. ft. warehouse in Whalley, a fleet of five vehicles, a lift truck, 400 active volunteers and a staff core of thirteen. The Surrey Food Bank Society currently distributes approximately 2,000 food hampers each week and supports over 30 community-based organizations throughout Surrey and North Delta with food and other items to aid in their programs. These include recovery houses, transition homes, shelters/missions, faith-based organizations, cultural/ethnic organizations, and after school programs.



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Client Services

At the Surrey Food Bank, we have created specialized programs to ensure we are providing food assistance to everyone who needs a hand up in our community.

Here are some of the changes in the Client Services department in the past year:

- Continue to provide hampers to an average of 250 households per day (approx. 750 people daily)
- Introduced Vegetarian Hampers (serving an average of 100 hampers per week)
- Opened an evening depot for working families (serving average of 35 households)
- Eliminated disability line to lessen client wait time
- Opened a new depot in Newton (Green Timbers Church) now serving 30 families

- Serving 80 families at our North Delta depot (twice per month)
- Serving 65 families at our Cloverdale depot (twice per month)
- Received a \$17,000 grant from United Way and piloted "Garden to Your Home"
- Established an appointment system from registration for new clients, with the goal of making a smoother and more convenient registration process.

Operations

Our Operations department has made some great improvements over the years. Here are some accomplishments from our Operations team:

- Testing the implementation of an inventory system to be used to concert weight poundage to dollar value or food items received into stock
- Expanded the parking lot with permission of owner north of the building
- Implemented Food Banks Canada Food Safe Program
- Majority of our Operations staff who operate material handling equipment are fully trained, tested and certified

- Continue to be challenged with serving food outside under a tent and as a team are working to look at alternate ways to address this unacceptable practice
- Best practice of completing daily log books in our fleet of trucks and daily maintenance reports for all warehouse equipment
- Added a second one tonne truck to our fleet which was donated by JRfm.

The Surrey Food Bank volunteers are the lifeblood of this organization. Without them, we would not exist. We always need volunteers who are motivated, hard-working and have the desire to help and provide services to our clients.

In the past year, we had:

- 400 active volunteers donate over 30,000 hours of service
- thousands of school children and corporate employees take part in our Meet The Bank volunteer experience
- an incredible response at our Sort-A-Thon, 14 groups participated (210 people) at our two-day volunteering event
- Maintained a core base of volunteers with a focus on youth.

Community Partnership & Engagement

Community partnership is key as we work together to help provide for our low income neighbours. We are so thankful for the new and continued partnerships, created and maintained this year.

This year, a new position was created – "Community Partnership Coordinator." The position proved to be very successful and is now a permanent full-time position. Through this position, we've increased our partnerships through: speaking presentations, media (print, radio and TV), community events, Food Bank tours and Meet the Banks, advertising and personal visits to donors.



We've also started a partnership between the Surrey Food Bank, Surrey Memorial Hospital and the Surrey Fire Fighters Charitable Society. The "We Live Here, We Give Here" campaign started in October 2012 and will run for one full year.


