About Us


The Surrey Food Bank is a non-profit organization committed to "helping people help themselves." Since 1983, the Surrey Food Bank has been assisting low-income individuals and families who live in Surrey and North Delta by providing bi-weekly food hampers to supplement their food needs.

All funding comes directly from the community as the food bank does not receive any core government funding

History

In 1981, in response to a downturn in the economy, a coalition of churches opened a food cupboard in Surrey. Two years later, in June 1983, the Surrey Food Bank Society was formed and opened up in a dilapidated building on King George Highway. The location and the Society itself were deemed to be temporary measures until the economy turned around and people could get back on their feet.

What began as a temporary solution to a temporary problem has grown to a 7,000 sq. ft. warehouse in Whalley, a fleet of five vehicles, a lift truck, 480 active volunteers and a staff core of fourteen. The Surrey Food Bank currently distributes approximately 2,000 food hampers each week and supports over 40 community-based organizations throughout Surrey and North Delta with food and other items to aid in their programs. These include recovery houses, transition homes, shelters/missions, faith-based organizations, cultural/ethnic organizations, and after school programs.



Letter from the Executive Director

The Surrey Food Bank continues to provide invaluable support to low income families in our community. We are recognized, respected and valued for the contributions we are making in Surrey and North Delta. In my 9th year as the Executive Director, I marvel at the amazing contributions made to this organization by our dedicated team of staff, volunteers, donors and community partners.

The highlights of the past year include the successful growth of our Seniors Depot, the creation of our Pre-K program which provides better nutrition for 2 – 5 year olds, the expansion of our Tiny Bundles and Toddler Tote programs and the much needed building improvements, which now allow us to invite our clients into our building where they receive all of their food items from one area- no longer outside under a tent. A small change but monumental for the well-being of our clients, volunteers and staff.

Of course, we continue delivering hampers to over 120 people with mobility issues and open our evening depot specifically for working families who are unable to access the food bank during the day. We invite our community service providers to join us during distribution hours so they can share with our clients the many services and supports they offer; services and support that can make positive change in peoples' lives - Fraser Health, Surrey Library, and Services Canada, just to name a few. If one piece of information or opportunity can change a life so that our clients no longer need the food bank, then we are all winners in the fight against hunger.

Our volunteers continue to flood us with their faithful support, contributing over 36,000 hours of work to help our operation run as smoothly as possible. It is like a 'well-oiled machine' when you watch them in action – packing hampers, sorting food, distributing food and helping to support events and food drives. Our volunteers are the life-blood of the Surrey Food Bank.

I am often asked how we do it. How do you attract and retain so many volunteers? How do you garner community donations and keep that generous ongoing support growing? How do you perform the day to day 'miracles' that you do, for so many people, with so few resources?

We do everything we do, because of People Like You – Donors, Volunteers and Clients.

Operations

Early in 2014, we made a decision to change our distribution model and we undertook a large renovation project of our warehouse in order to implement a model that will benefit our clients greatly. Our clients, staff, and volunteers have been out in the elements- sun, rain and snow- and now, with all renovations complete, everyone is inside. Our distribution is now done where the clients have the ability to receive their hampers, take part in our programs like Tiny Bundles and also interact with our community partners such as the Surrey Libraries, Surrey Fire Services, BC Hydro/Fortis BC and WorkBC, all in the same area inside the building.

Here are some accomplishments of our Operations team:

- Continue to serve an average of 250 households each day
- Reorganized our warehouse in preparation of our new distribution model
- Set up & implemented a second warehouse now used for donation and product storage
- Moved distribution model inside the main warehouse
- Hired two additional warehouse personnel
- Implemented new Holiday sort procedures
- Handled over 3,000,000lbs of food
- Purchased a new 3 ton truck to support movement of product between warehouses & as back up for other trucks
- Implemented organics recycling program

Client Services

As staff and volunteers, we constantly ask 'what are the needs of the community?' and 'how can we better address them?' This year we created a new specialized program to serve another growing demographic within our client base. The new Pre-K 2-5 program is an extension of our Tiny Bundles program. After graduation from our Tiny Bundles and Toddler Totes programs, we found that families were still in need of support with healthy snacks and proteins for their growing preschool aged children. Every two weeks, over 700 families with children aged 2 to 5 years receive a package of nutritious, healthy age appropriate snack items such as whole grain granola bars, fruit snacks, juices and either eggs, yogurt or cheese.

Our Client Services team had a busy year:

- Implemented our new food distribution model
- Continue to serve an average of 250 households per day
- Implemented our new Pre-K 2-5 program
- Our Tiny Bundles program continues to provide much needed items to our littlest clients:
 - 4,674 dairy supplements (milk & eggs) to pregnant or nursing moms at a cost of \$28,000
 - 5,993 weeks' worth of baby formula at a retail cost of over \$150,000
- 3,821 Toddler Totes
- 2,310 Pre-K Packages
- 262 Layettes & 202 Grad Gifts
- 2,310 Pre-K Packages
- Highest number of Tiny Bundles families in a day: 257


