# ABOUT US

The Surrey Food Bank is a member of Food Banks BC and an affiliate member of Food Banks Canada.





The Surrey Food Bank is a registered charity with a vision to "Grow Our Community Beyond Hunger". Since 1983, the Surrey Food Bank has been assisting individuals and families living in Surrey and North Delta by providing nutritious food to supplement their own food purchases. All funding comes from our community as the food bank does not receive any core government funding. The combination of the staff and community contributions whether they are financial gifts, food, volunteer time, initiative or skills is powerful.

### History

In 1981, in response to a downturn in the economy, a coalition of churches opened a food cupboard in Surrey. Two years later, in June 1983, the Surrey Food Bank Society was formed and opened up in a dilapidated building on King George Highway.

What began as a temporary solution to a temporary problem has grown to a 7,000 square foot warehouse in Whalley, a fleet of five vehicles, a lift truck, 150 active volunteers and a core staff of fifteen. The Surrey Food Bank Society currently distributes food to approximately 1500 families each week and has expanded its reach by providing food and household items to schools, shelters, missions and transition houses who are serving vulnerable populations.

Involving volunteers in our mission is an organizational value: We invite, inform, involve and inspire our community. Volunteers are the heart of the organization and work hand in hand with our staff to provide nutritious food in a respectful environment.



### **Board of Directors**

The Surrey Food Bank is run by an elected, volunteer Board of Directors. The Board oversees the Executive Director, staff and volunteers who manage the day to day operation of the Surrey Food Bank.

#### Letter from the Executive Director

It is my honor to have held the position of Executive Director of the Surrey Food Bank for the past thirteen years. In my time with this organization that I so love to serve, this past fiscal year of 2015 - 2016 has proven to have been one of the most challenging.

Hundreds of low income residents who have never needed our help before turned to us. Between February 1st and April 30th 2016 over 750 new families, including hundreds of Syrian refugees arrived to begin a new life in Surrey and looked to the Surrey Food Bank for the support they so desperately needed. We are proud to say that we were there to help, and no one was turned away for a lack of food or that much needed support.

Our Tiny Bundles program continues to be one of our 'signature' services with over 150 babies receiving a full serving of nutrition each week. Food Banks Canada's Hunger Count reported last March 2016 that the Surrey Food Bank has one of the highest number of children and babies using a food bank in all of Canada – not a statistic to be proud of, but thanks to our generous donors we continue to serve our most vulnerable little ones with the life changing support they need.

Our award winning program 'Hamper to Your Home' has a wait list. Many of our clients are aging or struggling with health issues that prevent them from coming to the food bank for their bi-weekly pick-up of food. Our hard working volunteers deliver a hamper directly to their doorstep. This program currently has a wait list of close to twenty low income residents who desperately need this help. Another challenge to find more volunteers to make this happen!

Our search for a new building has been made even more difficult with the escalating price of land and real estate in the lower mainland. We struggle to make our current facility work to help us serve others, but it is near to impossible to continue in such tight space and without adequate parking for our hundreds of clients, volunteers and staff. There was a 'bright light' at the end of August when we were approached by a community partner with a possible unexplored opportunity. To make this work we know we will need to lean on others to join together with us! Stay tuned for future news!

What HAS worked VERY well for us in 2015/16 is the perseverance of our team (staff, volunteers and Board of Directors), the generosity of our donors and community supporters, and most importantly the belief that together we ARE making a difference to the lives of others and are doing it in an outstanding way. The Surrey Food Bank family shines with Excellence in all they do!





# The Story Behind Our



### The Surrey Food Bank is a reflection of our roots.

Food banks began as a spontaneous and charitable community response to neighbours in need. They sprouted up around the country at a time when the economy was withering and the government was slow to respond. The foundation of all food banks was a spirit of generosity. Today this spirit lives on at the Surrey Food Bank; we are a vibrant place where community gathers.

There are three important points to consider when reviewing our financial statements.

#### WE DON'T RECEIVE ANY CORE FUNDING FROM THE GOVERNMENT.

Our donors come from all walks of life and undertake many types of initiatives to support us. We are blessed with the generosity of children who contribute their money from lemonade stands and birthday parties, schools and churches that host food and fund drives, corporations who rally their employees, seniors who knit and quilt for us. The gifts come in all shapes and sizes.

### VOLUNTEERS ARE ESSENTIAL TO BOTH OUR EFFICIENCY AND OUR HEART.

Last year volunteers contributed a total of 38,949 volunteer hours. This is the equivalent of almost 4900 days of service or 19 warehouse staff. Volunteers sort all the food coming in to the warehouse and distribute the food to our clients five days per week. They also represent us in the community at many events. Without this contribution, the staffing costs to manage our operations would double.

### OUR COMMUNITY'S FOOD DONATIONS ARE NOT REFLECTED IN OUR FINANCIAL STATEMENTS.

As our auditors' commented for this fiscal year: The Society also receives a significant amount of donated food contributions which the Society in turn distributes, the value of which was not recorded in these financial statements. The approximate value attributed to food donations is currently based on weight measurements priced at an average of \$2.50 per pound. For 2016, the estimated value for the approximate 2,250,000 pounds of food donations received is \$5,626,000.

We are proud of the efficient, yet, life-changing service we provide. We welcome the public to visit the Surrey Food Bank and see our operations. Please call us to organize a tour.




