History

In 1981, in response to a downturn in the economy, a coalition of churches opened a food cupboard in Surrey. Two years later, in June 1983, the Surrey Food Bank Society was formed and opened in a dilapidated building on King George Highway. The location and the Society itself were deemed to be temporary measures until the economy turned around and people could get back on their feet.

What began as a temporary solution to a temporary problem has grown to a 23,000 square foot facility in Newton, 3 community depots, a fleet of five vehicles, 2 lift trucks, more than 200 active volunteers and a core staff of fifteen. The Surrey Food Bank currently distributes food to approximately 1500 families each week and has expanded its reach by providing food and household items to the schools, shelters, missions, and transition houses who are serving vulnerable populations.

OUR NEW HOME

For nearly 4 decades the Surrey Food Bank has been an integral part of the communities of Surrey and North Delta. In 2020, after a multi-year search, we moved to a newer, larger facility in Newton, one nearly 3 times that of our original City Parkway facility. This new building has increased our capacity to procure, receive and distribute fresh and nutritious food for our clients, offer enhanced client programming and collaborate with our community partners in innovative ways. We are grateful to our clients and our community for their support and encouragement as we transitioned facilities at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Letter from the President of the Board

Nourishing Our Community. The first time I heard that phrase was at our food bank planning session this last summer. Every few years the leadership team of the food bank and the Society Board get together and create a Strategic plan to guide the food bank in the pursuit of its goals and objectives for a 3–5-year period. One of the things we talk about is our Vision and Mission. Vision is a clear statement of what we want to accomplish at the food bank - our purpose. Mission focuses on how we are going to fulfill that Vision. This is where one of our Directors first uttered the phrase "Nourishing Our Community". It was in answer to the question, "What do you think of when you think of the food bank?".

The dictionary defines nourish as, "provide with the food or other substances necessary for growth, health and good condition." Growth, health, and good condition, not just getting by or surviving week to week. This purpose was tested this last year in a way it never has been before. We were prepared for the change that would come with the move to our new facility and excited about how much more it could do to help us nourish our community. What we were not prepared for was a pandemic the likes of which most of us have never experienced. We had no idea whether we could continue to operate as we have for all these years. We were not sure whether volunteers would continue to volunteer, we were not sure donors would continue to donate, we were not sure clients would feel safe to come to the food bank, we were not sure our staff would feel safe to come to work and we were not we would have enough food to nourish our clients. Amazingly, belief in the food bank and the importance of what we do was so strong that we only had to shut our doors for a few days to accommodate our move from our old location but from then on we have remained open.

I would like to recognize the adaptability of our leadership team and staff at the food bank in rising to the occasion and finding ways to keep doing what we do and keeping each other, our volunteers and clients' safety and health of paramount importance. I would like to recognize all our donors who surely have been financially impacted by the pandemic yet continue to give what they can. I know it is because they believe in the good work we do at the food bank, and because like us they believe in the importance of continuing to nourish our community. Lastly, thank you to our clients for your patience with our new operating procedures and continuing to make us all feel appreciated for what we do here.

Like many businesses and organizations, the food bank was greatly affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Everyday has been a challenge to adapt to the changing nature of the pandemic, and to keep all our stakeholders safe and healthy. At the outset, we had to reduce our distribution centres, our volunteer count and find ways to procure and distribute food to our clients in a safe and socially distanced manner. We instituted a mandatory mask policy, physical distancing and enhanced cleaning protocols. As new public health orders were announced, our staff and volunteers remain committed to keeping our clients, donors, and ourselves as safe as possible. We would be remiss not to acknowledge our amazing volunteers for their commitment and support during this period. They have all gone above and beyond to make our operations efficient and safe in this trying time.


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
